
In Year 5 and 6 took part in a science workshop on Wednesday In Year 5, they were able to take part in observing chemical reactions as part of their Alchemy Island learning theme. In Year 6, they are studying the heart and they had the opportunity to dissect a lamb's heart. The person who ran the workshop was very complimentary about the behaviour and enthusiasm of the children.

In Year 4 they have been learning about colour mixing in the style of Kandinsky as well as learning how sound travels through the ear, while Year 3 were using their geographical skills to locate volcanoes on a map and thinking about their PSHE theme for this half term: bravery.

In Year 2, they have been finding out about the impact of deforestation on animals in the rainforest (I am sure parents have heard the story of Slowella the Sloth!). Year 1 were working hard creating sketches of London landmarks on Friday and Reception have been busy using

their measuring skills at their shoe shop!















Governor update

I'm delighted to say that Governors have begun visits to the school again after a year of communicating with the school from a distance and conducting all governor business via Zoom. Video conferencing has been great in enabling us to discuss strategic issues relating to the health, safety, education and welfare of the children but it's been frustrating not being able to see the school in action and how the children have settled back into school. However, in the past few weeks Governors have been back in for health and safety walk arounds, to discuss the school finances & strategic priorities and to see pupils and staff at work.

On Friday, I had the pleasure of visiting the school for the first time since last March. Both pupils and staff were so enthusiastic to be back to work. I managed to pop into most classes and the children were really excited to tell me about the hearts they had been dissecting in Y6, the sloth pictures they were making in Y2, the abstract art they were creating in year 4 and the phonics they were learning in reception. It was also useful to catch up with staff to discuss what areas of development they were focusing on and to hear their opinions on how resilient the children were and how they had settled back into school life.

Being a governor is a really great opportunity to see how the school works and also to help shape the future direction of Monkfrith. As parents, we often only know what is happening in our child's year group. We don't get to see the bigger picture of how educational opportunities are planned for, how pupils' needs are assessed and catered for, how staff are trained and developed to ensure they deliver a strong educational experience for Monkfrith's pupils.

At the end of the month two parent governor positions will become available on the governing body. The term of office for a governor is four years. You don't need to have prior experience of being a governor or of education, you just need to have a keen interest in the strategic development of the school, feel confident in expressing your views and have the time to commit to some evening meetings and school visits.

Nomination forms will be sent out before half term so keep a look out. It's an incredibly rewarding role and our friendly team of governors look forward to supporting new joiners to the board. What are the symptoms of Covid?

The NHS website states that the main symptoms remain:

- A temperature (hot to the touch, over 37.8°C)
- A new continuous cough
- A loss or change in taste or smell

If you are in any doubt or concerned about whether to get a test, the advice is to call 111.

If my child, or someone in my household develops symptoms, what should I do?

Your child should not come to school. Keep them at home and book a test. These are very easy to book now so, please avoid the home test kits, as this adds a delay to getting the result. Everyone in your household should isolate until you receive the result. If you have another child at school, they should not be sent in.

If the test is negative, you can stop your period of isolation and your child can return to school.

If the test is positive, you must inform us straight away so we can identify contacts and ask them to isolate. Please email the Office (even at the weekends). You must then engage with NHS Test and Trace and follow their advice in relation to isolation. We will provide work for your child during this time.
